## MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



#### Greetings!

I am pleased to report that our new Executive Director, Dr. Ling Hwey Jeng, has kept the paperwork flowing smoothly. This position was one of past-president Sushila Shah's more brilliant moves! Of course, she also keeps prodding me to get things done and comments on how very many meetings I seem to have in the public library world.

While seeking funding for the next Asian Pacific American Literature Award, Dr. Jeng found a possible corporate sponsor for a project that will aid three libraries in California to build their Asian language collections in the areas of practical community information and living skills. The grant will provide materials and workshops. Janet Tom, APALA's secretary and recently relocated to California, will be the local coordinator for the project. APALA will be the fiduciary agent for this grant, a task that can only increase APALA's credibility with corporate sponsors.

Elsewhere in this newsletter, you will find a thank you letter from the Asian American Federation of New York for the donation of \$500.00 approved by the APALA Executive Board. In seeking a way to help after the September 11th disaster, Gary Colmenar, Vice-President and President-Elect of APALA, searched for an organization that could truly benefit from our help. One area of need that had been little reported was the tremendous financial blow dealt the Asian communities who lived in the quarantined area near the World Trade Center. Overnight, jobs were lost as business came to a prolonged halt. Our contribution went to those whose need was great but who were not eligible for the United Way/Red Cross funds. My thanks to Gary and to all of those who helped him find an appropriate place for your expression of sympathy and aid.

With this newsletter, I would like to announce a new Special Committee; one that I hope will soon be recognized as a standing committee. Lisa Zhao has agreed to chair this special committee, the Web Committee. The greatest area of growth in communications during the past decade has been in the Internet world. With the present economy, face-to-face meetings and conference calls have become an expensive manner in which to conduct business. Our committee work is done via e-mail; our information is posted on our web sites. Our web site must reflect the APALA spirit. Lisa has already found one person who would like to work with her. ## **MEMBER NEWS**

On November 3, 2001, past president Amy D. Sectoo was among six other Chinese Americans honored as an "Unsung Hero" by the Coalition of Chinese American Organizations in Metropolitan Detroit. The award was given at the annual meeting of the Association of Chinese Americans, Detroit Chapter (of the Washington, DCbased Organization of Chinese Americans) in Dearborn, MI. The award was created to recognize people who work hard behind the scenes, performing tireless and consistent services to the community. When interviewed about the award. Amy said that she believes that APALA helped her to start her volunteer work for the Asian American community in Michigan and her experience with APALA encouraged her to reach out beyond the library world.

Amy D. Sectoo also organized a twohour Chinese language radio program launched on November 11, 2001 over WSDS AM in Salem, MI. Amy is one of the three women responsible for coordinating the program's content of Chinese music, literature and interviews with notable localarea Chinese Americans. Amy is in charge of interviews and she has engaged colleagues from the U. of Michigan Schools of Public Health and Music for her first sessions. The mission of the program is to promote Chinese and American cultural exchange and to help new immigrants become adjusted to the U.S. Amy is currently working as a professional interpreter.

**Bonnie C. Lew**, Supervising Librarian, Stockton-San Joaquin County Public Library, worked with three Chinese American groups to co-sponsor (with the Library) two showings of the documentary film We Served With Pride: The Chinese American Experience in World War II on November 4 and 5, 2001. Executive Producer of the film and military historian Montgomery Hom led discussions of the film; the two programs honored five veterans who appeared in the documentary and a roll call of attending local veterans

was featured. Many of the 158 veterans who live in Stockton were able to attend one or both screenings with family members and friends. Bonnie reported that the purpose of the programs was to foster racial harmony and understanding between Chinese Americans and the other ethnic groups in the city, a theme of Stockton's mayor, as well as to support the Library's service goal of cultural awareness programming and collections. She wrote a successful minigrant application to the California Council for the Humanities to underwrite the programs' expenses. Bonnie also received grants from the California State Library for Citizens for Life, the sole public library-based project of the California Civil Liberties Public Education Program. Citizens for Life takes former internees of the Japanese American "internment camps" into the schools and to community groups to talk about their wartime experiences. The Stockton Chapter of JACL is the partner organization with the Library; the Library donates books and videos to school libraries as part of the educational project and has also enriched its collections of materials on Japanese Americans as a result.
